Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

At Upton Noble Church of England VC Primary School, we provide a high quality of education for all of our pupils regardless of ability or background. We are a Church school with a Christian ethos and ensure all our Children “Let their lights shine”. We acknowledge, however, that the educational outcomes for children eligible for the Pupil Premium Grant are not as good nationally as the attainment of children who do not receive the grant. With this in mind, we have prioritised our spending so that this pupil group have the best targeted help to enable them to do at least as well as their peers in both the core areas of Mathematics and English as well as in other areas of their education including health and wellbeing. We want to provide an inspirational and inclusive environment with high quality first teaching and learning, focussed support, curriculum enrichment and pastoral care. Supporting our children’s health and wellbeing to enable them to access learning at an appropriate level is key as well as continuing to develop a culture of aspiration and to make the most of every learning opportunity.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	A lack of experiences to build cultural capital amongst some of our Pupil Premium Grant children has impacted regarding Speech and language, vocabulary acquisition and understanding, knowledge and understanding of the world and practical skill development.
2	Social, Emotional concerns impact children’s ability to learn effectively and demonstrate and develop independence, resilience and determination. These attributes are pivotal for successful learning and must be addressed to secure positive progress for all our children including Pupil Premium Grant children.
3	Some of our Pupil premium Grant cohort are impacted by Special Educational Needs, which are an additional barrier to progress and attainment.
4	The involvement of parents in activities such as reading at home and wider learning opportunities at home has a negative impact on some of our Pupil premium Grant children.
5	Attendance of a small number of our PPG children has a negative impact on progress and attainment.
